Hong Kong's serviced apartment providers **Kush** are taking their environmental responsibility seriously with a handful of new eco friendly policies including using eco-friendly paint and non-toxic cleaning products in their apartments. Tenants are provided with eco kettles, re-usable shopping bags and the Kush Octopus pre-paid Go Card to encourage a switch from gas gussling taxis to public transport. Using movement sensors, timers and dimmer switches to help reduce lighting consumption they're creating a shining example of how rented accommodation can start to be eco-friendly.

3. Making a lighter footprint

Scientists and economists agree that we need to cut carbon emissions by as much as 60 percent by 2050 in order to limit the risks of major environmental, social and economic upheaval. As china's only carbon neutral hotel **URBN Boutique Hotel Shanghai** is leading the way to greener hospitality by monitoring the hotel's energy consumption, including staff commutes, food and beverage delivery and energy used by each guest to calculate the hotel's carbon footprint then investing carbon credits in local "green" energy development and emission reduction projects. There's definitely something cool about this place, and it's not just thanks to the eco-friendly passive solar shades and water based AC systems. The entire creation has been committed to green from the ground up – using reclaimed hardwoods, old Shanghai bricks and other recycled local materials to renovate an existing building. As Director Jules Kwan says, "our vision is to create destinations of comfort, style and interest across China. Our first hotel is unlike any other, and we want to be at the forefront of promoting environmental awareness, protection and sustainable buildings within the hotel industry."
